

## What is Grassland Habitat?

Grasslands in Pennsylvania are areas dominated by grasses such as little and big bluestem, Indian grass, as well as flowering plants such as goldenrod, black-eyed Susan and other herbaceous plants. Shrubs and small trees are uncommon.

## Status of Grasslands in Pennsylvania

Native grassland habitat has been declining in Pennsylvania due to conversion for other uses (e.g., urban, agriculture) and encroachment of trees and shrubs.

## Why Are Grasslands Important?

- Grasslands can serve as primary habitat, or as travel corridors, for a variety of wildlife.
- Grasslands help protect soil, filter sediment and chemicals from runoff, thus enhancing water quality, and
- Grasslands are often colorful, vibrant and thus aesthetically appealing.

## How Are Grasslands Managed?

Grasslands can be established and managed using a variety of best management practices including:

- Brush clearing
- Carefully timed biannual mowing
- Seeding of prairie grasses and other native plants
- Prescribed burning
- Selective use of herbicides

## What Assistance May Be Available To Landowners?

- **Technical Assistance** for habitat management may be available through various conservation programs and personnel, including:
  - Landowner Incentive Program (LIP), Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program (WHIP), Farm and Ranchland Protection Program (FRPP), & Grassland Reserve Program (GRP)
  - A professional biologist who can work to help you develop a habitat management plan that benefits wildlife and helps meet *your* wildlife management goals.
- **Habitat Management Assistance** may also be available for implementing the habitat management plan for your property-contingent upon availability of funding.
- **Habitat Protection** funds for long-term protection, such as conservation easements, may be available for *your* land. Contact a resource professional.
